



OVERVIEW:

The market is characterized by widespread transitions and weather-related volatility. South Georgia is nearing the end of its harvest for Zucchini, Bell Pepper, Corn, and Cucumber, while the industry watches a severe cold front that could prematurely terminate the season in South Georgia and North Florida. Tomato production is concurrently shifting, with Florida gaining momentum as South Georgia maintains steady output, complementing the ramp-up underway in Nogales. Grape season is concluding in California, with supply moving offshore. Melon supply from Firebaugh is largely finished, with Yuma production tight due to rain and lower-thanexpected yields. Limited Pineapple availability persists, requiring flexibility on sizing from shippers. The Salinas season is rapidly approaching its end amidst persistent issues with quality (pin rot, decay, larvae) and low yields, driven by soil diseases, insect pressure, and sporadic weather. This limited supply is escalating prices for many commodities. Severe shortages are expected across all Lettuce varieties (Romaine, Hearts, Red/Green Leaf, Boston/Butter), Cauliflower, Broccolini, Snow Peas, and Sugar Snap Peas, with these markets remaining at extreme levels. Tight supplies and high markets continue for Brussels Sprouts, Fennel/Anise, Artichokes (small sizing), Broccoli, Bok Choy, Celery, Spring Mix, Arugula, and Cabbage. Further, vessel delays on the East Coast and weather issues in Guatemala are severely disrupting the movement and quality of Snow Peas, Sugar Snap Peas, and various Baby Carrots and French Beans. Growers expect rain in Oxnard and Santa Maria next week, potentially delaying berry harvests, which will be mitigated by supplementing supply from Central Mexico, leading to temporary changes in pack-outs. Looking ahead, significant supply and quality disruptions are expected as the industry navigates the bumpy transition to winter production, exacerbated by unusual rain in the Yuma region. In the avocado sector, US volume modestly stepped down to 57.4 million pounds, with Mexican fruit maintaining a stable flow of 54.7 million pounds despite recent road blockages. California is rapidly finishing up. The new Citrus program for 2025-2026 has commenced, though rain predicted in Dinuba may temporarily halt harvesting. Navels are peaking on medium sizes (72s/88s), with large fruit expected to tighten. CA Pink Grapefruit is concluding as Texas/Desert Rio volume slowly begins. Lemon supply is improving on small sizes (165s+) with harvest in Districts 1 and 3 providing good availability across the size spectrum. California Mandarins are starting slowly, preceding the ramp-up of Cara Caras and Bloods in December. Finally, California Garlic supplies are currently reported as good.

BERRIES



Strawberries

Demand exceeds supply, making November the tightest and highest-priced period, with relief not expected for 3-4 weeks. Salinas/Watsonville production is ending, and the seasonal decline is not offset by ramping volume and strong quality from Central Mexico (CMEX) and Southern California. Rain is forecast for Oxnard and Santa Maria next week.



Blackberries

Supplies have improved due to steady increases from CMEX and Baja, alongside active Watsonville production. However, quality remains inconsistent with some reports of color reversion, soft, or overripe fruit linked to recent regional heat and humidity.



Raspberries

Supplies tightened following rain and the seasonal decline in Oxnard and the end of the Watsonville season. Production continues in CMEX, Baja, and Oxnard with good overall quality, though soft/overripe fruit is noted due to recent weather.



Supplies are steady. Active production and good quality/sizing from CMEX are well-balanced by strong imports from Peru, contributing to market stability.

Blueberries

CITRUS



Small sizes (165s and smaller) remain a challenging, tight commodity as most crops are producing larger fruit.



Supply is steady across all sizes, but expect mixed quality over the next few weeks.



Specialties

Blood Oranges, Cara Caras, Minneolas, and Mandarins are nearly finished for the season. Grapefruit is available, though Fancy grade is light. Blood Oranges are running small.

Green & Red Leaf

- Iceberg: Extremely limited supply. Severe prorates. Fair quality: INSV, light weight, ribby. High market. Weather harms harvest/quality. Rain expected: near-term gaps. Yields declining to transition.
- Iceberg VA: Tight supply/prorates. Fair quality. Weather hurts harvest/quality. Yields dropping to transition.
- Romaine & Hearts: Extremely tight supply. Market climbing (high demand). Fair quality: bruising, damage, fringe burn, light cup, pest/disease. Minimal heart material. Severe prorates. Weather harms harvest/quality. Yields dropping to transition.
- Romaine VA: Extremely limited supply. Severe prorates. Acceptable quality. Weather harms harvest/quality. Yields dropping to transition.

Extremely constrained supply. Prorates expected. Fair quality: mildew, fringe burn, light weights. Weather harms harvest/quality.

MELONS



Cantaloupe

Guatemala harvest started; arrivals expected next week. Sizing heavy on 9s, some 12s. Good quality, firm fruit (11-14% brix). Shippers moving to different offshore ports.

Domestic supply shrinking (both coasts), driving prices up. Mexico supply constrained by production issues (past rain).



TOMATOES - USA



Round & Roma

Round: Supply ramping up (Ruskin/Palmetto). South Georgia stable. Good quality. Roma: Supply ramping up. Quality mixed; should improve as Florida volume increases.

Snacking (Cherry, Grape, Medley)

AMPLE supply from summer programs, transitioning to South Georgia/Florida next week. Outstanding quality.

California

California volume is mostly done for the season due to weather.



Round Steady volume (McAllen/Otay). Good quality.

Roma Volume improving (McAllen/Otay). Good quality.

Grape Excellent supply. Weak demand lowers price. Good quality.

Cherry Most volume crossing from Baja. Very good quality. Demand flat.

Mixed Medley Good supply (McAllen/Otay). Mostly good quality.

On the Vine Stable volume available this week.

FRUITS & VEGETABLES



The U.S. received 54.7 million pounds from a59.9\$ million-pound harvest last week. Mexico's Jalisco region contributed 6.8% of this volume. Both the Main Crop 70.2% of volume) and Off-Bloom Crop show consistent sizing, peaking on 48s and 60s, with dry matter for both over 28%. Wet season rain has resulted in an expected presence of Lenticel (small external brown spots), which does not affect internal quality. APEAM continues to enforce the minimum 23% dry matter standard for harvest. California volume is minimal (last week's harvest was 2.6 million pounds, peaking on 48s and 60s) and the season is expected to conclude this month.

Avocados



Supply is stable, and quality is excellent despite high demand from schools ramping up.

Bananas



Supply will remain severely restricted for the next year or more due to sustained low production in Central America (drought, poor yield, and reduced acreage). While contracts are secure, flexibility on sizing is essential to maintain supply chain stability. Quality and flavor are good.

Pineapple



California's fall production is winding down, driving pricing higher due to consistent demand. Expect mixed quality, including increased shatter, waterberry, and reduced shelf life as the fruit ages. Green varieties are very limited, while Red (Autumn Royals, Scarlets, Globes) and Black (Sweet Saphire) varieties (Autumn Kings, Autumn Crisp) remain available. Storage fruit is anticipated to begin moving by mid-November.

Steady supply, all regions. Good quality.

Color Bell Pepper




Domestic (Fresno/S. Georgia) supply steady, good quality. Mexico crossings ramping up.

Slicer: Border crossings (Otay/Nogales/McAllen) may be lighter due to Baja/Sonora rain delays. Domestic (S. Georgia) stable. Good quality all regions. English: Light supply this week. Good quality.






Extremely tight supply, good quality. Fall pull/high demand (schools/football) driving prices up. Organic is EXTREME.



Lighter supply in West; strong out of South Georgia. All new crop; good quality.



Lower yields cause supply shortage. Pricing stays escalated until supply improves. Some prorates seen (growers holding 8-week averages).





Supply fully supported by storage shipments; no major challenges. Strong sizing/availability across all categories. Burbanks start shipping mid-October in limited volume (Norkotahs dominant). Long-term outlook soft until late spring.
